The Heron



Heron's are tall, with long legs, a long beak and grey.

They eat fish and small mammals so find them near water or roaming through fields looking for mice. Even better to spot them flying with their massive wingspan!



The Kingfisher



Look out for a flash of their unmistakable blue and orange colours and they swoop low over water. As name suggests, they're the king of all fishers!



The Magpie



One for sorrow, two for joy? Not so much joy if you're a small songbird. These large corvids raid nests for eggs in Spring and summer but they're only feeding their young! Look out for blackbirds defending their nest and scaring the magpies away!



The Wren



This small, brown bird with its stubby tail has one of the most beautiful songs in Spring and Summer.

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The Goldfinch



These little finches have a beautiful red face (the males) and golden wings.

They stay in colonies so if you see one, you'll likely see more. Put sunflower hearts or niger seeds in your bird feeders and goldfinches will no doubt come!



The Starling



Starlings have beautiful flashes of purple and green. They're amazing mimickers and I once heard them convincingly imitate a train at Guildford Railway Station. In winter they flock together or 'murmurate' making one of the most incredible natural sights.



The Raven



The Raven is the biggest member of the crow family. Large, black, and impressive.

The best thing about the Raven is its call. A deep, loud honk. It's known as an upland bird but there's one nesting in a tree by my house near Bristol.



The Skylark



The lark is a small, streaky brown bird with a crest. It is renowned for its display flight, vertically up in the air.
